We are getting as close to grizzly bears in the wild as possible with Indigenous guides that are highly trained professional bear viewing guides with experience in grizzly bear behavior. Your safety is our top priority, along with respecting the natural habit of the grizzly bears.

Along the Klite River, we provide six viewing towers, that provide optimal sight lines to this natural phenomenon. Our tours are intentionally small to allow for the most intimate experience with the bears. Listen closely and you will hear their heavy breaths mingle with the rushing water - it is an exhilarating and truly amazing spectacle that only a select few will have the privilege of seeing.



THE EXPERIENCE

You will depart from Campbell River with one of our partners. The tour from Campbell River to Toba Inlet is about 2 hours in length and includes time to watch for marine life, including Humpback Whales, and view beautiful scenery of Toba Inlet include several major waterfalls. From Toba Inlet our Klahoose guides meet the guests, with a traditional welcome and orientation. From the dock, we drive by bus, about 10 minutes into the coastal rain forest where we have built bear viewing platforms on the Klite River. Here we have six covered and raised platforms set along the Klite River where spend between 2-3 hour watching the bears with our guides.

BEAR VIEWING SEASON:

- Late August to Mid-October
- Tour Length from Toba Inlet: 3 Hours

GRIZZLY BEAR VIEWING HIGHLIGHTS:

- Experience the pristine coastal wilderness of Desolation Sound and Toba Inlet
- Boat tours from Campbell River specifically for viewing marine wildlife with Interpretation by your certified Naturalist and Captain
- Discover Yekwamen (Toba Inlet) with your Klahoose First Nation guide while on land
- 3 hours on land viewing grizzly bears from covered and raised viewing platforms.





THE TOBA VALLEY

Toba Inlet is one of the principal inlets of the British Columbia Coast and on the edge of the Great Bear Rainforest. Toba Inlet is relatively short in comparison to the other coastal inlets, being only about 2.5 kilometres in average width and 35 km from the mouth of the powerful Toba River. The Inlet is a deep fjord and is flanked by towering mountains and several major cascading waterfalls.

The Klahoose peoples have lived in here on the central west coast of British Columbia since time before memory. Klahoose First Nation territories span from Cortes Island to the Toba Valley in proximity to our neighbours of the Homalco and Tla'amin Nations. Here stands, towering cedar trees interwoven with glacial streams and rocky shores that welcome the arrival of spawning Pacific salmon at the end of each summer. This breathtaking backdrop draws grizzlies to the Toba Valley where they socialize with each other and feast on the bounty of fresh fish.

Klahoose Coastal Adventures is pleased to offer you the opportunity to visit the Bears of Toba Inlet in their natural habitat, undisturbed as they nourish themselves in local riverbeds.

Toba Inlet inaccessible by car, remains remote and largely uninhabited by humans. Here, you will find the Ursus arctos horribillis or grizzly bear.

Years of restrictive legislation which forbid the practicing of our cultural traditions has impacted our Nation tremendously. To combat this cultural loss, we embarked on a journey to rejuvenate our traditions, language, and identity. We are encouraged by the interest of our youth who are eager to reconnect the threads of our past to the framework of modern life.

Your visit to our territory strengths our opportunities to do this and on behalf of our Council and membership, we extend our welcome and gratitude. We wish you safe travels and hope you enjoy your time with us.
